1 Scale Back

2 Gather Feedback

If system implementation is failing, gather feedback to understand why and develop a corrective action plan. This can include more training, increased awareness, and highlighting system benefits.



3 Seek Assistance

There are resources that can help a struggling implementation learn the correct maintenance, reliability, and operational tactics to move the program forward.



4 Begin Focusing on Proactive Maintenance

To be effective, you need a proactive approach to maintenance. When switching mindsets, take a gradual approach. As the new routine is adopted, roll out the plan to other assets. Over time, company culture will shift.



5 Establish Clear Objectives

Having AOM goals, like reducing equipment breakdowns or tracking maintenance performance, is vital. Base goals on your organization's needs and consult with all levels of personnel. Plan for how these objectives will happen and how to measure success.



6 Get an Implementation Process Together

The process needs to be spelled out, complete with timelines and milestones. Key points to consider are data, hardware, workflows, and training. Have one person spearhead the operation but make sure everyone is in on the process.



7 Train on the Purpose of AOM

Train personnel on how AOM supports a holistic company strategy. This helps with any misconceptions about its intended use. It's also vital for employee buy-in. By showing how AOM makes their job easier, you'll gain more support.



8 Consult the Software Provider
